Phillips Brooks was a great preacher who is primarily known for writing "O Little Town of Bethlehem." He also made an insightful comment about Christmas. "The earth has grown old with its burden of care, but at Christmas it always is young, the heart of the jewel burns lustrous and fair, and its soul full of music breaks the air, when the song of angels is sung."

Christmas is over, at least according to the calendar. It is time to pack up the decorations, throw out the tree (or store it away if it's artificial), return unwanted gifts, and finish off the eggnog.

Every year it saddens my heart to see Christmas come and go so quickly. And I think that it is because as Phillips claims, "Christmas it always is young, the heart of the jewel burns lustrous and fair, and its soul full of music breaks the air, when the song of angels is sung."

But if we merely go back to our regular routines, haven't we missed the point of Christmas?

The world may move on and forget but we are called to remember Emmanuel – God is still with us. # Faith Lutheran Church Council Meeting—6:00 pm December 18, 2014

Present: Pr. Nate, Pat Rioux, Mark Whittington, John Albaugh, Al Bauman, Rich Collins, Howard Larsen, Tracy Marcus, Jim Nelson, Cheryl Zarns, Maureen Miller, Tom Lippert, Deb Colombe

Maureen Miller moved and Rich Collins seconded to accept the Secretary's Report. Motion carried.

Rich Collins moved and Mark Whittington seconded to approve the Treasurer's report. Motion carried. Tom Lippert went through the 2015 proposed budget line by line with council. Howard Larsen moved and Jim Nelson seconded to accept it. Motion carried. After discussion about Mission funding, Pat moved and John Albaugh seconded to take 10% of the weekly General Fund giving and deposit it into a newly created Mission Ministry checking account. Motion carried. Any giving envelopes with designated mission funds will go into this checking account. It is suggested that the Mission team elect a treasurer to track the debits and credits. A quarterly report will be generated for council on the disbursements.

Pat Rioux moved and John Albaugh seconded to give appreciation gifts to the following: Kate Bjorge \$500, Joan Novak \$300, Jenny Zietler \$150, Kay Campbell \$150. Motion carried.

### Pastor's Report:

Pr. Nate would like to lead a 6-8 week session on marriage from materials still remaining from the "I Still Do" simulcast. He also reported that Greg Hyatt would like to lead a Bible study in the coming year. Sunday, January 25, 2015, was chosen as the date for the Faith annual meeting.

### **Old Business:**

The Executive Council met for the annual Pastor evaluation.

Mark Whittington created a job description for the housekeeper position which will be posted in the next couple of bulletins. Applicants can pick up job applications and a copy of the position description in the office. The Executive Council will review and choose from received applications. Lyle Frerichs will be plowing the parking lot this winter and the donated snowblower will be used for the other entrances to the building. The main entrance will be shoveled off by volunteers. The sign-up sheet is in the narthex. Please consider volunteering. The Faith Boutique raised almost \$2,600, of which 10% will go to Missions. Howard Larsen moved and Mark Whittington seconded to purchase another coat rack from the Boutique funds. The motion passed. John Albaugh moved and Maureen seconded to approve the bid to build the new sound booth for \$4,000. Motion carried. Pat Rioux reported that most of the biographies of the council nominees have been received. Going off council at the end of the year are Deb Colombe, Jim Nelson, John Albaugh and Pat Rioux.

#### **New Business:**

The Mission Ministry team council representative John Albaugh requested the following funds:

LCMC \$500 to complete our annual commitment, Phil Zarns Sweden ministry \$500, Bonnie Bzdok's Resilient Uganda mission, St. Paul Lutheran Seminary \$500, and Bethany Barnett mission in Ireland \$500. John Albaugh moved and Tracy Marcus seconded to approve the funding with motion passing. Maureen Miller explained that Bonnie Bzdok is helping vulnerable Ugandan women learn self-supporting skills. Al Bauman talked about the need for a large TV with a good sound bar that would be wall mounted in the narthex. Discussion followed on the wiring requirements. Al Bauman moved and Rich Collins seconded that the necessary funds be used from the men's Wednesday breakfast fund for the purchase. Motion carried. Howard Larsen moved and Rich Collins seconded that \$700 be used from the furnishings account for purchasing table cloths and two more kitchen carts. Motion carried.

When you are reading this, our team of 10 individuals will be in Jamaica on their mission trip. They are scheduled to be gone from December 27<sup>th</sup> to January 4<sup>th</sup>. Keep them in your prayers.

The Mission/Outreach team is wrapping up 2014 with a flourish. We approved requests to LCMC for the second half of our annual pledge of \$1,000, and \$500 to St. Paul Seminary. In addition we approved bequests of \$500 each to three international mission efforts all of which have local roots; Phil Zarn's Swedish Mission, Bethany Barnett in Ireland, and Bonnie Bzdok's Resilient Uganda.


# **Church Council Candidates Biographies:**
